AB 1743	O'Donnell	California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Program.	Current law establishes the California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Program, administered by the State Department of Education, with the purpose of encouraging and maintaining the delivery of career technical education programs during implementation of the school district and charter school local control funding formula. Current law appropriates specified amounts for the program from the General Fund for the 2015–16, 2016–17, and 2017–18 fiscal years, and provides minimum eligibility standards for grant applicants. This bill would instead specify that the purpose of the program is to encourage and maintain the delivery of high-quality career technical education programs.	Support	Donna Artukovic	
AB 1871	Bonta	Charter schools: free and reduced-price meals.	The Charter Schools Act of 1992 provides for the establishment and operation of charter schools, and exempts charter schools from the laws governing school districts, except as specified. This bill would require a charter school to provide each needy pupil with one nutritionally adequate free or reduced-price meal during each schoolday. To the extent this bill would impose additional duties on charter school officials, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.	Support	Carol Kocivar	
AB 1951	O'Donnell	Pupil assessments: Pathways to College Act.	Would require, pursuant to specified provisions of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act, the Superintendent of Public Instruction to approve a nationally recognized high school assessment that a local educational agency, as defined, may, at its own discretion, administer, commencing with the 2019–20 school year, and each school year thereafter, in lieu of the consortium summative assessment in English language arts and mathematics for grade 11. AB 2808	Muratsuchi	Education finance: local control funding formula: funding increase.	Current law requires funding pursuant to the local control funding formula to include, in addition to a base grant, supplemental and concentration grant add-ons that are based on the percentage of pupils who are English learners, foster youth, or eligible for free or reduced-price meals, as specified, served by a school district or charter school. Current law requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to compute the supplemental and concentration grant add-ons as certain percentages of the amount of the base grant. This bill would delete the provision specifying the amount of the base grant in the 2013–14 fiscal year and would instead specify new, higher amounts for the 2018–19 fiscal year, which would also increase the supplemental and concentration grant amounts and	Support	Anita Avrick, Carol Kocivar	1982 resolution “THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE LEGISLATURE FOR THE FINANCING OF PUBLIC EDUCATION”: “Resolved that the California State PTA urge its membership to demand that their elected representatives provide the resources necessary for quality public education for California’s children.”

<u>AB 2878</u>	<u>Chávez</u>	<p><i>Local control and accountability plans: annual goals: state priorities: family engagement.</i></p>	<p><i>Current law requires the governing board of each school district and each county board of education to adopt a local control and accountability plan using a template adopted by the State Board of Education. Current law requires the local control and accountability plan to include a description of the annual goals to be achieved for each of certain state priorities, which include implementation of the academic content and performance standards adopted by the state board, as specified, and the specific actions that will be taken to achieve the annual goals.
